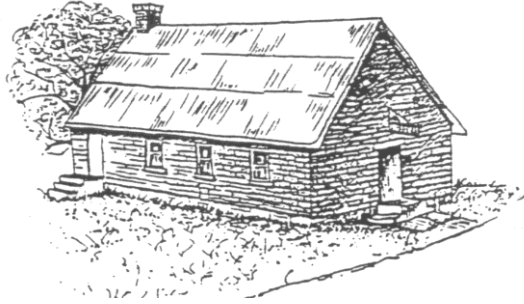

LOOKING BACK

THE FOLLOWING ARTICLE, AVAILABLE AT THE GOULBOURN MUSEUM, WAS WRITTEN BY J. WILLOUGHBY SHORE IN 1936. MR. SHORE WAS BORN IN THE VILLAGE OF ASHTON IN 1858. HE RECOUNTS MANY INTERESTING STORIES FROM HIS LIFE GROWING UP AND WORKING IN ASHTON AND THE SURROUNDING DISTRICT.

REMINISCENSES OF J. WILLOUGHBY SHORE

This is the Third Part of a three part series. In Part Two, Mr. Shore described school life in Ottawa during the 1870's, and his subsequent employment as a teacher in Goulbourn Township. He told of his marriage to Gertrude Steacy in 1887 and of the birth of their two daughters. Following the death of his first wife, Mr. Shore married Jean Loviok in 1902. The couple had one son Phillip John Willoughby.

I joined the Independent Order of Foresters about the year 1885 and the I.O.O.F in the year 1903. I enjoyed the meetings in Court Larentian very much and we had a very nice social lot of men then, viz., John Hart, Harvey Spencer, W.T. Wilson, George Hayes, Charlie Robertson and many others.

I was paid off when I became 67 years. I was sent as a delegate for Court Laurentian to the High Court held at Smiths Falls, Brockville and Peterborough and at the latter meeting I was appointed a delegate to the Supreme Court to be held at Atlantic City. I attended the meeting and had a very good time altogether. Dr. Oronateke was the Supreme Chief Ranger. I enjoyed attending all these meetings very much especially the Supreme Court meeting at Atlantic City. As already intimated I joined Carleton Lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows in January 1903 but have not taken quite as much interest in it. The members desired to elect me to the highest office, Noble Grand, as I had filled some of the lower positions in the Lodge, but as I had been elected to the position of Public School Trustee, I had not time and did not accept the position offered me. I have been in the Lodge for 25 years and have been presented with an old member's (25 years) Jewel. I am still a member of the Order.

I have taken considerable interest in Church matters all my life as my father and mother were always good Church people. Before the Rectory was built at Ashton, the congregation there was connected with Richmond or Franktown and Prospect. Canon Pettit of Richmond came to Ashton and previous to his coming to Ashton, I remember my mother informing me that the Rev. Mr. Godfrey from the 3rd line of Huntley used to come to hold service in Ashton in the very early days of the settlement. I remember Canon Pettit coming to Ashton.

In Bishop Lewis' time, Ashton congregation was joined to Franktown and Prospect and I remember many of the Clergymen who were Rectors of Franktown and who came to Ashton, viz., Rev. Mr. Nesbitt, afterwards Canon, Rev. John Fisher, who afterwards went to Tilaonburg in South-Western Ontario, Revds. Irwin, Tighe, Robertson, who was the Rector when the Rectory was built at Ashton. Previous to this however, Ashton had again been attached to Richmond and St. Thomas' Parish at Stanley's Corners. The Rev. Mr. Jannet, the Rector of Richmond was a very fine man and he started services at Munster, and afterwards had a Church building erected there and Munster has since, with Prospect, been attached to Ashton and became

the Ashton Parish. Since then the Rectors have been the Rev. Robertson, Johnston, John Fisher (still living in Ottawa), Butler (for nearly 10 years), who got subscriptions to build a new Church, Holmes (who got the present Church building built), Pellit (who married the daughter of the Presbyterian Minister - Miss Henderson, Heaven, Reid, and Ellacott, the present Minister. Previous to the erection of the Rectory at Ashton, my Father and Mother had entertained the Bishops and Clergymen for over forty years and I have been a delegate for about thirty years, first for the Parish of Madawaska and for many years past for the congregation of All Saints Church, Ottawa, (my own Parish). I have also been a delegate to the Provincial Synod for very many years and was elected a member of the Council of that organization.

I have been also a member or delegate to the General Synod for nearly 20 years. I have attended five General Synods at Hamilton, London, Kingston, Toronto and Montreal. At the Montreal Synod, I was elected to the Executive Council. I did not go to the meeting in Calgary in 1935 but intend to go to the meeting of the Executive this month (Sept. 1936) in Toronto. I have attended 3 or 4 meetings of the Provincial Synod at London, North Bay, Toronto and Belleville. I was appointed with General Winters to the Council of the Provincial Synod at the first meeting I attended at London. The Council holds a meeting once a year in April in Toronto and I have always attended these meetings. I have also been elected each year at the Ottawa Synod to the Executive of the Ottawa Synod. It meets 4 times a year and I have always attended if possible and I introduced the motion to increase the number of delegates from the larger Parishes from 3 to 6 which has increased the interest in Synod considerable.

I have been a member of several committees of our own Diocese. The last was the Restoration Fund Committee. The year before I was married (1886) I bought a half lot on Somerset Street near Bank and built a house thereon in 1887. On the request of my Father, I bought 25 acres on the 8th Line of Goulbourn that formerly belonged to my Uncle Thomas Garland who had died. I afterwards sold this 25 acres to James Graham. I also bought a double house on Daly Ave., Nos 225-227, about the year 1911 and have lived in half (no 225) ever since. I also bought two lots at Wychwood on the Banks of the Ottawa River (Quebec) in the year 1909 and built a cottage there, but have since sold it (in 1932) to Mr. Edgar Robertson. Our family moved to the cottage every summer for about eleven years and we enjoyed our Summers there very much, boating, swimming and playing tennis. Previous to selling the cottage, I rented it for about 15 years and Mr. Robertson was my last tenant and he got to like the place so well that he offered to buy it. Since I rented the cottage we have gone to different places each summer, viz., above the settlement at Queen's Park, Aylmer, for 2 years, and to Baskin's wharf for 2 years on Mr. C. Bray's property and since then across the River from Kirk's Ferry, first in Miss Caddy's cottage and afterwards in a cottage belonging to the Hull Power Co. We all enjoyed our summers on the Gatineau as well as on the Ottawa very, very much either in cottage or camping and it seemed to do all the family much good for their work the year following.

My service in the Department of Indian Affairs extended over a period of 47 years and 6 months. I had been an accountant for many years before my retirement in 1932 on Superannuation as I was then 74 years old and had been recommended by the Deputy Minister, Mr. Duncan Campbell Scott, to be kept on the three previous years.

Since I was superannuated, I have had a very quiet uneventful life looking after my houses, renting them etc. and collecting the rents.

Gertrude came home from Japan in 1932 being her second furlow and we rented the cottage on the Cantley side of the Gatineau from Kirk's Ferry, which was the last year of our Summer Cottage life. We had a very good garden of vegetables and also sweet peas. We had a picnic this year, 1936, for Frances at the cottage on one Sunday after she came home from St. John, N.B. after visiting the Rev. and Mrs. Bracken there for two weeks. We had a very enjoyable time swimming and seeing the old place. The garden is in a very bad condition, being overgrown with Golden Rod and Scotch Thistles, six feet high.

MUSEUM NOTES

On behalf of the Historical Society Board of Directors and the Museum Committee, I would like to wish President, Don McMillan a full and speedy recovery from his recent illness. We look forward to the day when Don is back at the helm, encouraging and directing our Society programmes and activities.

This year we had 511 visitors to the Museum. Of this number 88 people are listed as having conducted genealogical research at the Museum with the assistance of staff and volunteers. In addition, the Museum received 75 requests electronically for genealogical or local history research. The vast majority of these requests were submitted through our interactive website. This research service raised \$575.00 for the Museum. Our website was visited by approximately 2000 people in the past year. This year, we are planning a number of website enhancements which involve the uploading of additional historic resources, including local census information. Website changes are very labour intensive and our museum is constantly faced with the dilemma of how to improve, or introduce services in one area, while maintaining our existing programs. This fall, we introduced several new items to our gift shop including our first annual Goulbourn Heritage calendar, as well as golfshirts and totebags. Total giftshop sales for 2002 were \$1,600.00.

The Museum received 5 visits from school and community groups in the past year. The Curator and volunteers give local history presentations to these groups. Museum exhibits are explained and local artifacts and pioneer clothing are shown. For some time now, we have wanted to improve these presentations by utilizing age specific resources, however, we have always been restricted by time and funding.

Museum educational programming is currently undergoing renewed interest from the public. The teaching of local history is being encouraged in the school system, and museums are being seen as a vehicle for introducing these programs. As it is increasingly expensive for schools to make transportation arrangements to visit museums, many teachers are asking for local history resources right at their site. Local history education kits, which can include stories, artifacts, games, crafts etc., are considered to be an important part of the historical resources available to teaching staff. These teacher-directed kits allow instructors the flexibility of incorporating community history into their programming in accordance with their timetable, rather than having to rely on either visiting local museums or arranging for a museum educator to visit their classroom. Our Museum hopes to increase our level of educational programming, in the upcoming years, by making enhancements to our current local history presentations for schools and community groups, and by designing educational kits for the classroom.

Many thanks to Janet Stavinga, Councillor for the City of Ottawa, John Baird, MPP Nepean-Carleton and David Pratt MP Nepean-Carleton. Members of all three levels of government offered support and encouragement in the past year for our Museum and Historical Society programs and assisted us with their respective government's grant programs.

This year the Museum set up heritage displays at Canada Day (Stittsville Village Square), the Richmond Fair and at the Stittsville Villagefest. Heritage Day was celebrated at the Goulbourn Museum with a program which saw long time residents of Goulbourn give their recollections of growing up and working in our community. Self-guided tour brochures for the villages of Richmond and Ashton were completed by Museum staff, this past summer. Brochures for the communities of Ashton and Munster will be made available in 2003.

The Historical Society enjoyed an active program this past year including: several excellent guest speakers, a pioneer cemetery tour, a visit to the Perth Museum and the Diefenbunker, as well as a bus trip along the Opeongo Settlement Trail. We would like to extend our thanks to Joan Darby, Program Committee Chair, for her work over the past two years. Joan provided wonderful leadership to our Committee, and we were thankful for the organizational skills and sense of humor she brought to all our meetings.

An exhibit outlining the history of the Stittsville rail has now been installed in the kiosk along the Trans Canada Trail, west of the Village Square. The display, compiled by the Goulbourn Museum, includes several photographs from our collection.

Wishing all our members the very best for 2003.

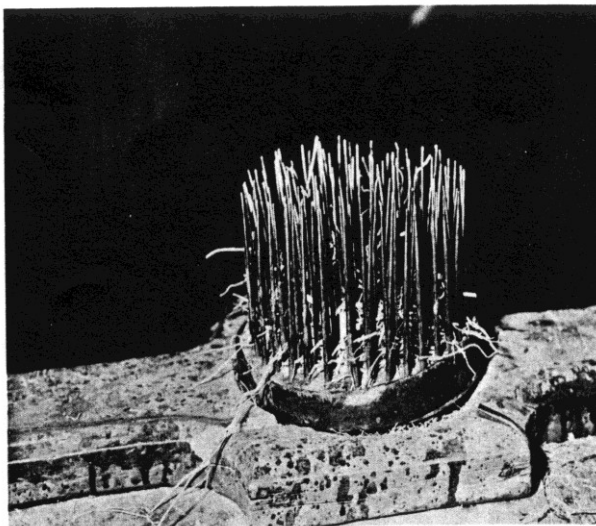
DID YOU KNOW

(Taken from the book titled "What is it?" written by Lorraine O'Byrne in 1977.) Where and what does the phrase "HECKLE, HACKLE" come from and mean?:

A heckle is an instrument made up of large spikes driven through a board, to form a coarse comb. Flax or hemp is cleaned and carded (combed) by being drawn through the heckle. This process "teases" or ruffles the fibres pulling out the tangles and the short broken pieces. To "heckle" someone today certainly can be equated with this teasing and ruffling process.

Another spelling for heckle is hackle. Angry fowl raise their neck feathers until it looks as if someone ruffled them with a hackle. These feathers are known as hackles.

Humans when they become angry are said "to raise their hackles".

TURKEY SPAGHETTI CASSEROLE

- 1 ½ to 2 cups diced, cooked turkey
- 1 ¼ cups spaghetti
- 1/2 medium onion, minced
- 1/2 cup turkey broth or water
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1/4 cup diced pimiento
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 can mushroom soup
- 3/4 cup grated sharp cheese

Cook spaghetti in boiling, salted water. Drain. Mix turkey, pimiento, green pepper and onion; spread in medium casserole dish. Mix soup and broth together and stir into cooked spaghetti. Pour this over the turkey in casserole and blend. Season to taste. Top with grated cheese and bake, uncovered, for about 45 minutes in 350°F oven.
